## WYNNEWOOD NORTH NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION GENERAL MEETING THURSDAY, JANUARY 21, 2016

- I. Call Meeting to Order The meeting was called to order at 7:01 p.m. by Brian Davis.
- II. Guest Speakers from Habitat for Humanity ReStore Program, with guest speakers Sarah Brown & Amy Glover. Fallyn introduced our speakers and explained the ReStore Program. Amy is the director of Habitat for Humanity and Sarah is the coordinator for the ReStore Program.

Amy spoke about Habitat for Humanity. People think that Jimmy Carter started Habitat, but while he is a big proponent, he didn't start it! People think Habitat gives their homes away for free, but that is not true. Families have to qualify based on income and have to be capable of paying a mortgage which is very affordable with a very low interest rate. The homes after they are built are cheaper than an apartment. Owners have to put in sweat equity on their home, go through financial training and help build other homes. They have a very high success rate. If a home is foreclosed on, they have a Second Chance Program that offers the home to others. They also have a Brush with Kindness Program. They currently have a waiting list. The main requirement is the income and the ability to pay back. If they have blown their credit, it won't keep them from getting a home. Volunteer opportunities are available! After age 18, they can help build a home, including using power tools. Before that age 14-16 can help with landscaping and age 17 can help build but not use power tools. Construction is available Wednesday through Saturday. No tools are required. It's a great organization and we would love to see you!

Sarah – ReStore is non-profit and are locally owned and operated by the local Habitat. !00% of the proceeds go back to Habitat. The main job of volunteers is to assist the staff members and to help create a friendly atmosphere including normal retail such as retail sales, display, stocking. This is a very flexible volunteer opportunity with a two-hour minimum. You can come any day of the week as they are open 7 days a week. They have recently launched a core volunteer program. Volunteers commit 4 hours a month for at least 3 months. They will receive one on one training by staff members and a really cool blue t-shirt and a 10% discount after three months. Location is at Hampton and Singleton. The items that are donated are usually sold and the revenue is used to fund other homes. There are three other stores in Dallas other than the one on Hampton. They also have a program for high school students as it helps them gain retail experience and non-profit experience. Must be at least 14 to help in the store. We have a new donations manager who has been great in getting wonderful donations. When items are sent over to the store there are very few items that aren't recycled, for those items that need work, there is another group they donate those items to. If you have a lot of items to donate, they have a truck that will pick up. The best drop off store is the West Dallas store.

**III. Approval of October General Meeting Minutes.** A motion was made by Cynthia Michaels and Janice Coffee. The motion carried unanimously.

IV. Officer Reports.

a. Treasurer – Denise –. It's a new year, so don't forget about corporate matching. We are now part of Amazon Smile. If you use Amazon, you can now go to the link and donate to the neighborhood association. We are also still linked with Tom Thumb and Kroger. Amazon Smile will pay out 0.5% of the purchase you make back to Wynnewood North. Once you designate Wynnewood you don't have to change your selection yearly. Denise will also be setting up Target.

We have ended December with 14,288.29.00 for YTD we have income of \$12,236.32. The YTD total funds on hand are 14,288.29. A motion was made by Janice Coffee and seconded by Susan Oakley to approve the Treasurer's Report. The motion passed unanimously.

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- b. Vice President Fallyn The grant applications are due soon. Fallyn will be sending out a survey for ideas for the grant. The first meeting at OOCCL was an introduction of the new Board. The new president this year is Judy Pollack. There are 32 representatives from Oak Cliff at the OOCCL meetings. Meetings are the first Mondays at La Ca Doce's backroom. OOCCL will be looking for volunteers for a Saturday event.
- c. Beautification Cynthia Michaels Street light was replaced at Woolsey and Shelmire and pot holes fixes at Mayrant. Sewer replacement, and the gutter was also repaired. Working at getting the metal box removed at Monssen and Vernon. Time Warner owns the box. The box appears to be abandoned. Solar lights have been installed at the Wynnewood signs and Cynthia set them in concrete. We would like for people to participate in the Pickup Ten Pieces of Trash program that the City sponsors. Whatever we can keep from going in the creek or on our streets. Cynthia also has a little trash grabber that will safe your back. We will put the reminder on our website and also Wynnewood Neighbors. She will check it out to you for use, you will need to sign for it in blood. The culverts are almost ½ blocked with trash. She has called it into the city twice. Yard of the Month program will continue as normal. Winners will receive \$25 from Callaway's.
- d. Communications Janice Coffee We have new neighbors Jack and Charles at 724 Woolsey! Directories have all been distributed. We will also have one new neighbor on Hoel who will be moving in shortly. Janice also thanked all the Block Captains who have passed out all of the directories and newsletters and flyers throughout the past year.

There will be a new VIP class coming up in February. VIP's are the ones who help keep this neighborhood safe and that is largely due in part to our very active VIP program.
