
A Word from Our President | Denise Requardt



Dallas County Proposals

Five Dallas City Council Members - proposed changes to boost housing units

Reach out was made to Chad West and team for high level information to share with neighbors in reference to the proposal sent to the City of Dallas Housing Committee to reduce minimum lot sizes. Below are some key points received.

***The details shared below do not reflect views or opinions by the WNNA Board of Directors. Informational only. Denise Requardt

<u>Per Chad West's liaison</u> –The main idea is that right now the memo was meant to have staff present to the council on how reducing the required minimum lot sizes would affect the city and how it would increase housing options. There is no change happening now. Mr. West also would like to focus this on empty lots and exclude historically preserved neighborhoods.

Key Proposals:

Introduction of "Tri-plex" and "Four-plex" Units: New housing types to be recognized in city planning.

Reduction of Minimum Lot Sizes: Smaller lot sizes in single-family zones to allow for more efficient land use.

Expansion of Housing in Existing Zones: Permitting the new housing types in current residential areas.

Building Code Amendments: Adjusting city codes to accommodate these new structures.

Purpose: These changes aim to address Dallas's growing need for affordable housing by increasing the availability and variety of residential units.

Potential Benefits: This proposal could lead to more diverse housing options, better use of urban space, and increased affordability for residents.

Please note this would be a huge undertaking and would take years if even possible.

Wynnewood Village Update


Statement from Brixmor Representative:

The fencing you see on the southwest side of the shopping village is all for the Target store in one way or another. Some of it is to keep the building pad safe, some for the parking lot expansion, and some for a storage/staging area for Target to use during their construction. We're working to deliver the completed pad to Target in the Spring, with Target still confirming their construction schedule subject to their permits.



Generally, things seem to be tracking well. We're in design on some of our façade improvements and working on our pre-leasing goals. We did sign a lease with Burlington to take over the space next to Ross and hope to be under construction in the spring. Unfortunately, I do not have any news on the Kroger front as of now but continue to keep my fingers crossed.


The neighbor was able to keep him at his home safe, and that's when the networking kicked in.

I'm really happy to report that the "75 for 75" planting initiative reached our first year goal and planted 24 new trees on December 13th! We had a variety of trees planted, including Chinkapin Oaks, Pecans, and Burr Oaks among others at 17 households across the neighborhood. The city provided these trees to us free of charge, and they were all beautiful specimens that were larger than expected. We want to thank all the new tree adopters for taking on this responsibility, and we are so excited to watch these new additions to our neighborhood grow and thrive in the coming years.

The "75 for 75" project managers are now starting to focus on finding new adopters for our second planting at the end of 2024. We already have a few neighbors signed up, but there are lots of spots left for those that are interested in becoming an adopter. 

When it is time to place out bulk trash, you will see signs posted at each entrance into our neighborhood. If you don't see the sign, DO NOT PUT out bulk trash because it is too early or too late.

Bulk Trash for Wynnewood North is the fourth Monday of each month. The City allows you to place the trash out beginning the Thursday prior to the fourth Monday. Our dedicated volunteer Terry Thomas faithfully puts up the signs on the correct Thursday so that we all stay compliant with the City of Dallas

Trees and Your Electric Service

Notification tags were delivered to Wynnewood North homes recently in reference to tree triming. Oncor states the timeframe is usually within 3 months after the first notification. A second notification should be received prior to the trimming. Here is the notification some residents received:

Dear Homeowner, Wright Tree Service, specialists under contract with Oncor, will be in your neighborhood pruning trees and removing vegetation a safe distance away from the power lines.

Trees growing too close to power lines can cause damage to Oncor facilities and interrupt service to you and your neighbors. Oncor's goal is to provide for the safe and reliable delivery of energy.

If you are not at home on the day of the work, we will proceed in a professional manner with any necessary pruning and clean-up.

Helen Louise Dadds passed away peacefully at home surrounded by family December 27, 2023 at the age of 93. Funeral Services to be held Saturday Jan 20th at Kessler Park Methodist Church at 2pm

Helen Louise Dodds was born on July 28, 1930, at the Broadacres Ranch in Maricopa County, Arizona, to Jesse James Dodds and Lucile Hill Dodds. Helen faced adversity at an early age being born during "the great depression" and her father passing away when she was 9 years old, leaving her widowed mother to raised Helen by herself. She was a scholar and graduated from Wainwright High School as Valedictorian in 1947 and from Northeastern State College in Tahlequah, Ok, in 1951. Her first employment after college was secretary to the Muskogee County School Superintendent - 1951-1955; she later moved to Dallas Texas and was employed by a railroad shipping company and quickly worked her way up to executive secretary to the President of the company.

Helen moved to Dallas in 1955 and married Charles Schneider November 2, 1956. Helen and Chuck settled in to their 1st and only home in Wynnewood North in 1963. They paid \$19,000 for the home. In 1964 Helen and Chuck took in a foster son name Raymond Caswell who became a jr golden gloves champion. Ray was killed in action as a 1st lieutenant. Helen retired from her professional career to be a full-time devoted mother to their daugh-

ter Shelley Rae in 1971. Helen continued her quest in life to be involved and of service to others. Helen played a large role in the school's PTA while teaching Sunday school on Sundays.

Early 1970s, Helen and Chuck created and maintained a long-term relationship as a neighborhood representative with the Dallas Police Department. Beginning with Officer Bruce Hickman who would keep up with the neighborhood issues and do daily surveillances throughout the years. This was the beginning of the WNHA (Wynnewood North Homeowners Association. Chuck passed April 13th, 2021.

End of Year 2023 Summary

Wynnewood North funded many activities throughout 2023 including this newsletter, two parades, 12 Yard-of-the-Month awards, three awards for Christmas decorations, a Spring Wander, a Fall Wander, and a Christmas party.

We also funded various administrative expenses including the web site, triangle park maintenance and Christmas decorations. We began the year with \$14,871 in our bank account. Throughout the year, we took in an additional \$17,004 and spent \$18,425, for an ending total of \$13,449.

Even though we spent a bit more than we took in, the difference was relatively minimal. We expect a similar amount of revenue in 2024 and will look to trim expenses to end closer to balance.






