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Crime Watch

I can't believe it's already April! It seems like just yesterday I innocently attended a general neighborhood meeting, and voila! I left as the WNNA Crime Watch Director! Actually, I must admit, part of my motivation in accepting the position came from Melanie Loe. She was such an inspiration and gave so much to our wonderful community, I felt the least I could do was give something back in her honor.

My first order of business has been to pilot the WNNA "VIPer" patrol program. If you've seen bright flashing lights pass by your house in the last couple of months, it could well have been one of our VIP teams. What is VIP? Volunteers in Patrol is a group of residents interested in deterring crime in our neighborhood. Each VIP member has attended a four-hour training with the Dallas Police Department to hone their observation and reporting skills. After completing training, VIP members can sign up for one or two hour monthly neighborhood patrols. Active, frequent patrols create a presence in our community and put criminals on notice that we're on the lookout. Patrols are randomly scheduled, so there's no telling when those flashing lights may appear. With VIPers on the loose, we intend to let criminals know Wynnewood North is not an easy target!!

If you're already trained as a VIP and want to be part of a VIPer patrol, please email me at crime@wynnewoodnorth.org or call me at 214-943 -5673 and let me know your availability. We ask that each VIP volunteer a minimum of one to two hours per month. (It may be a testament to my exciting (NOT!) life, but I think the patrols are fun!). If you're interested in becoming a VIP and need to be trained, please email Lynn Sulander at lynnsulander@sbcglobal.net or call her at 214-941-0135. She will be setting up a VIP training for May or June. And many thanks to Jeff Sappenfield, Pat Ford, and Richard London for creating and organizing our VIPer supplies. Our patrols couldn't have started without their preliminary work.

Now to the nitty gritty: neighborhood crime in 2009. From January 1 to late March, we have had 3 burglaries, 2 thefts, 3 criminal mischief/vandalisms, and one disorderly conduct (phone harassment). Of course, even one crime is one too many, so please continue to watch out for yourself and your neighbors. A few safety tips:

ALWAYS keep garage doors closed, and exterior doors and windows locked.

ALWAYS park your locked vehicle in the driveway or in the garage, and NEVER keep valuables or personal items in your vehicle.

ALWAYS call 911 any time you see suspicious persons, activities, or vehicles. When you call, provide as many details as possible and use the term "suspicious" (person/activity/vehicle). That elevates the urgency of the call and allows for a quicker response time. If you ever have an instance when you feel your calls have not been responded to in an appropriate manner, let me know and I will discuss it with our liaison at the Dallas Police Department.

Want to keep up with crimes occurring in our neighborhood? Terry Thomas regularly updates our Crime Watch phone line at 214-967-5157. If you're more of a techie type, you can see our crime watch stats online at www.dallaspolice.net. Click on "Public Access", accept their disclaimer, and enter the search parameters. For a general search, it's easiest to search by either a street name or our beat number (451) and reporting areas (4166, 4167, 4192).

As we head into the warmer months, be safe, be observant, and report any suspicious activity. There's no better way to add value to our neighborhood, and your neighbors will thank you!

Choosing the Right Flowers

Well it is that time of year to plant your bedding plants for Spring and Summer color. Choosing flowers can be an overwhelming task when growing and cultivating plants is not your specialty. Recently, while wandering through the endless flats of flowers at the Dallas Farmer's market, an energetic young man name Carlos who worked for Ruibals, pushed a full color brochure into my hand and started advising me about what types of flowers to choose. I have to admit that my first reaction was to steer the "no thanks, just looking" route, but as he flipped through the brochure, I was really impressed with the quality and usability of this brochure. It is only a ten page folded letter-sized brochure, but in those ten pages, there are almost 200 different options for flowers and bedding plants with full color photos of each. Furthermore, the clearly labeled photos are referenced as "sun", "part-sun/shade", and "shade" to provide customers expertise at their fingertips. So if you are one of those people who has difficulty finding the right flowers for your sunny and/or shady areas, this guide is exactly what you need to make sure you don't buy impulsively and come home with plants that stop blooming or burn up because they were not suited for the amount of light that they receive in your planting area. If you've ever made these mistakes, you know how frustrating it can be. Now Ruibals has not paid for any advertising for the newsletter, nor do I think you have to necessarily shop there. However, the guide is top notch so I don't mind their receiving a little free press in return for the use of this great reference tool. If you stop by Farmer's market, ask for the Ruibals Plants of Texas guide, but better yet, download it yourself at http://www.ruibals.com/annuals.html. You will find it an excellent reference to assist you with your Spring planting.




Tales from 506 Woolsey

Maalox and nose drops and needles for knitting, Walkers and handrails and new dental fittings, Bundles of magazines tied up in string, These are a few of my favorite things.


