Spring has to be my favorite time of year and I'm sure you've already seen yards springing to life and warmer temperatures pulling us outside everyday. I have received numerous requests for the neighborhood garage sale again this year. We will

be having the event on Saturday, May 14th. The neighborhood will place an ad with the Dallas Morning News announcing the activity. There will not be a required donation to the neighborhood this year as in years past. However, there are numerous changes to the city ordinance regarding garage sales. Each home planning on having a garage sale will be required to obtain a permit at a cost of \$15 each. You are issued a sign for your yard that identifies that you have obtained a permit. The permit is good for 3 consecutive days and each home owner is only allowed to obtain 2 permits per year. Also, you are only allowed to post your sign in your yard. All violations of the city ordinance are subject to fines. Please go to dallascityhall.com and click on the garage sale link to see specifics on how to obtain your permit and the specific rules and regulations around the new ordinance.

Finally, we are planning on having the Spring Wander on May 21st. If you are interested in hosting this event then please let me know. Also, if you cannot host but would like to co-host the event by helping to support the financial commitment then please call me as well. You can reach me at 214-941-2657 or e-mail social@wynnewoodnorth.org. The wanders are our biggest fundraising events of the year and their success hinges on some of our great neighbors hosting. Please give some serious consideration to how you can help support our neighborhood. We will start to sell tickets to this event in early May once we have confirmed that we have all of the host homes lined up.

Everyone is welcome — there will be a bounce house for the kids this year!





Tip of the Month — April

CALLOWAY'S NURSERY

Your garden is much like the palette of an artist. The colors you use have the ability to affect our emotions and set the tone of the surroundings. There is no right or wrong way to choosing colors for your garden.

Cool colors such as green, blue and purple provide a tranquil, restful feel to a garden. They are great to use in spaces where you want to relax. Green is soothing to the eye and will complement many of the other stronger colors. It provides stability throughout the seasons. Blue is a receding color and is the first to disappear from view at nightfall so use it in large blocks so it can be seen. Purple evokes the feeling of romance and stimulates imagination.

Warm colors like red, yellow and orange tend to draw attention and excitement. Use them by doors, walkways and in far corners of your garden to draw attention to spots which might be overlooked. Warm colors can also be overpowering to the eye so use them carefully. In cooler weather, red flowers in the garden or in containers will create a feeling of warmth. Yellow is associated with sunshine and is therefore a positive, energy-building color.

White is the color of purity, innocence and cleanliness. It gives the impression that the garden is well organized and well planned. White is an excellent choice for an evening garden where it helps the landscape "stand out" in the shadows. Use white as an accent to other colors.

As you create your landscape design, remember there are other ways to add color to your garden. Colorful ceramic pottery, stepping stones and even decorative mulches add interest and textures to a landscape. Your garden should be as unique as you are so, think outside the box and explore your creative side!




Oak Cliff Earth Day Sunday, April 17th Noon — 5:00p.m.

Neighborhood Garage Sale — May 14th



Wynnewood North plans to have a neighborhood-wide garage sale on May 14th. Such an event draws many people to the neighborhood since they know they can drop by multiple houses looking for a great bargain.

Due to new Dallas City ordinances, each house must obtain a permit though at a cost of \$15. You can visit http://www.dallascityhall.com/code_compliance/garage_sales.html for more information. There is a link on the site to purchase a permit for the garage sale, or you can visit any Dallas Public Library to get a permit.

The new ordinance only permits households to hold two sales per 12-month period, and signs may only be placed on the lot where the sale takes place. Signs placed on medians, public property or utility poles are illegal.








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
Spring Wander — May 21st
