

### Wild Wynnewood: Coyotes & The Greenbelt

Did you know...

- Biologists have documented natural litter sizes of coyotes between one and nineteen pups.
- Coyotes possess a unique ability to adjust the size of an unborn litter based on population density (of other coyotes) and availability of food/resources.
- Sheds, woodpiles, and crawl spaces make great coyote dens. Greenbelts, sewer/drainage systems, and DART lines do not (they make good routes tho).
- Extraction and relocation programs of coyotes are futile based on the coyote's reproductive abilities.
- People and coyotes are equally afraid of each other.
- Coyotes regularly eat rats, squirrels, mice, garbage, fruit, and dog poop, but rarely cats (less than 1% of diet).

You may have seen coyotes wandering at night in Wynnewood North. They are permanent residents in the

City of Dallas and will never be eradicated. In fact, based on the facts above, it is a misuse of tax dollars to even try to eliminate them, as the survivors will re-populate the area within two years.

To avoid unnecessary contact with coyotes in your yard, please take the following steps:

- 1) Clean up after your pets (in your yard and in the greenbelt). The high fiber content in pet food passes through your pet's tummy undigested.
- 2) Do not leave cat or dog food outside. It's an easy meal because it won't run away from coons, possums, birds, rats, mice, or coyotes.
- 3) Eliminate den locations by sealing up decks, crawlspaces, car carriages, etc.
- 4) If you see a covote during the day, spray it with water, yell and scream at it, or throw rocks to keep it afraid of human contact. Do not feed it.

At times, she barks a "hello" to neighborhood dogs out walking their owners. At other times, she barks at petless neighbors to express how happy and excited she is to see them. Even though she knows it's best to restrain from barking (as some of us startle easy), sometimes it is just too hard to keep quiet.

### **Criminal Minds**

The rash of package burglaries across Dallas has finally stopped with the capture of the culprits; however, packages are still easy targets for thieves. We encourage you to make special arrangements for package delivery if your porch is not designed to conceal packages. Use tracking software, rely on neighbors that work from home to pick up your packages, and requiring signature for delivery are some of the suggestions posted on Nextdoor to eliminate package theft. During June, we experienced multiple middle-of-the-night crimes. Exposed vehicles were both broken into and stripped of valuable parts. Since there are few reasons for traffic between midnight and 5 AM in our neighborhood, please keep a vigilant eye on any vehicle driving slow or stopped on the street during these hours. Call 911 ASAP. To reduce your risk of being a target, park in your garage or carport if possible. If not, use your driveway instead of the street parking to deter thieves and vandals. Finally, lock your car doors and truck tailgates after removing all valuables or bags that may tempt the mischievous.

#### Special Commentary and Remembering the Fallen

I have worked as Crime Watch Director for 2 ½ years in addition to coordinating our VIP patrols since 2009. After this last week, I just wanted to say a few words about our officers in the Dallas Police Department (DPD).

DPD is known nationwide for their outreach programs and citizen involvement within Dallas communities and neighborhoods. VIP programs (such as ours) are highly successful due to the fact that officers and neighbors communicate, interact, and work together as a team. We are grateful that officers like Shawn Hejke and the Southwest Precinct are assigned to our beat. They are quick to respond when we have questions, concerns, or need information about suspicious behavior. Their sensitivity training really shines through. These guys are professionals and are examples to other police forces across the country.

The attacks of last week have taken a heavy toll on the Southwest Precinct (the majority of deaths and injuries were associated with its team). It has also emotionally affected all of us. It's critical that we continue our positive interaction with the force anyway we can. It's a stressful job, and simple things can help: things such as a wave as they drive by, saying 'Hi' when we see them on the street, a blue ribbon showing our appreciation, or just letting them know that we support them in their duties and appreciate their professionalism.



Several neighbors, including April Sarlay of Woolsey Drive have led efforts to ribbon-ize Wynnewood North in support of our local police department.

Wynnewood North is a very diverse neighborhood, and I feel as a community we respect our DPD and work with them as well as any other neighborhood. I hear that all the time from neighbors and officers alike. The next few days are going to be rough as memorials for fallen officers are conducted. Keep these families in your prayers, and if you see a patrol in the neighborhood – wave, say hi, or give them a thumbs-up to let them know Wynnewood North supports the women and men in blue.



### Beautification

Many thanks to the neighbors that participated in our spring cleanup and beautification efforts of public spaces. This year we focused on the standard triangle maintenance and trash cleanup of the alleyway of Bizerte. We appreciate our local KROGER for providing



donuts to our neighborhood workers that day.

Speaking of alleys, we remind all neighbors to maintain their alley. Here's why:

- The city may issue citations for failing to maintain a clean and clear alley
- VIP patrols cannot pass through overgrown alleys and dirty streets (flat tires are frequent)
- Emergency vehicles may be hampered from providing services (police, fire, EMT)
- It's common courtesy to your neighbors
- Utility service can be affected by alley neglect
- Solid waste (garbage) and recycle service accessibility can be impeded due to wider trucks

### **Calloway's Tips for Summer Gardens**

Because July is often a very dry and hot month, maintenance is the focus. The best time to do any kind of gardening or maintenance is early in the morning or late in the day when temperatures are cooler. Now is the time to sit back and relax while enjoying the beautiful garden areas you've created.

Proper watering is essential to keep plants healthy during the Summer. It is best to water as deeply and infrequently as possible, as opposed to frequent light sprinklings. This will encourage a deeper root system that can take advantage of water stored in the soil.

One of the best strategies for getting shrubs and young trees through summertime is to apply a thick layer of mulch over the root systems of plants. Mulches break down over time, so if it has been awhile since you've mulched, check all the plants in your yard. A three to four inch layer will prevent most evaporation from the soil and lower the soil temperature in the root zone, reducing stress on the root system.

Drip irrigation combined with mulch is an excellent way to maintain your garden and lawn. Drip irrigation, also known as trickle or micro irrigation or irrigation is a method that saves water and fertilizer by allowing water to drip slowly to the roots of plants, either into the soil surface or directly into the root zone, through a network

of valves, pipes, tubing, and emitters. It is done through narrow tubes that deliver water directly to the base of the plant. This allows for fertilizer and nutrient loss to be minimized due to localized application and reduced Leaching. Soil erosion and weed growth is also lessened with this type of irrigation.

Drip irrigation also allows the foliage to remain dry which reducing the risk of disease. If drip irrigation is not an option, consider using soaker hoses to provide a good source of water to your garden or bedding plants.

Water plants in containers and hanging baskets more frequently in the Summer to keep them from drying out. This can leach out plant nutrients from the soil, so use a water-soluble fertilizer regularly to keep your plants growing and healthy.



### Adamson High School: From an Old Leopard to the New Leopards

Recent DISD school boundary realignments have returned Wynnewood North to Adamson High School boundaries. Janice Coffee, a longtime resident and WNNA board member has provided the following article to welcome us back to the Leopard's Den! She's volunteered to 'bore anyone to tears' with stories of Adamson if you give her a call.

Adamson was founded in 1888 as Oak Cliff High School. In 1936, it was renamed to honor William H Adamson, who served as principal from 1900 until his death in 1935. Mr. Howard A Allen, who had been assistant principal starting in the late 20's, took over as principal and held the position until 61, when he retired (my class of 1961 proved to be too much for him). The school occupied three locations before the brick building at the corner of Beckley and Ninth was built in 1915.

#### Alumni

E King Gill (1920) was one of the first graduates to make a mark on the world. After graduating, he attended Texas A&M. During the 1922 Dixie Classic football game, the A&M coach made an open request to any student spectator with previous football experience to suit up for the game (the team had been decimated by injuries and flu). Gill volunteered, but sat on the bench for the game. He became known as the '12th Man' and to this day, loyal Aggies stand continuously throughout the game to show they are ready to be called into the game.

Four Sprague boys graduated from Adamson and went on to captain their college football teams. George C. Sprague became the first president and dean of UT Southwestern Medical School in 1967.

Some musicians you may be familiar are former Leopards: Michael Martin Murphey, Ray Wylie Hubbard, BW Stevenson (My Maria), Ray Price (For the Good Times), Henry Price (New York Metropolitan Opera with Beverly Sills), and Larry Groce (Junk Food Junkie).

Other alumni of note are Congressman and Speaker of the House, Jim Wright (Love Field's Wright Amendment [Class of 39]), "Spanky" McFarland from the Little Rascals and his baby brother, Rod (who still sits on the Alumni Board), Yvonne Craig of Batgirl fame (attended Adamson but graduated from Sunset), and Maurice Acers (Class of 25) worked for the FBI for 14 years-including a stint as national director of personnel. He married Ebby Halliday.

#### **Scholarships and Funding**

In 1947 a teacher started a scholarship fund for Adamson; in the years since then, the Alumni Association has given over 1.5 million in scholarships. This past May, over \$44K went to graduating seniors. I have been secretary of the Alumni Association for 15 years. We give thousands of dollars each year to student activities and departments such as English, theatre, art, and band to name a few. As you can see, I'm very proud to be a Leopard and of the history that goes with it.

no way my license and VISA would be back at Chimayo–besides, we had already looked there!



### Hot Weather Tips For Your Pet

Summertime is a time for fun and frolicking but it's also fraught with danger for our pets. When the temperature rises, we need to take extra caution to make sure our pets are okay in the heat. Here are some key tips to help keep your pet cool and safe:

- Don't leave your pet alone in the car on a warm day. Despite the warnings, every year, pets die after their owners leave them in a parked car that overheats. Within just a few minutes, a car can get extremely hot, stifling, and deadly.
- Be Vigilant about vet care. When it starts getting warm outside, take your dog or cat to the vet for a full checkup. The checkup should include a heartworm test and a flea and tick protection plan. These are year-round issues, but in the summer months with much more outdoor time, it's especially important to monitor them.
- Give your pets access to shade and plenty of water. Pets can get dehydrated or get heatstroke quickly so any pet outside needs to have plenty of water and access to shade.

### **Showcase Pets**

Three quadrupeds reign supreme at 715 Woolsey as part of the Gary Ellis household. Chelsie, the little girl of the family, rules over her two brothers Finn and Brinx. The three rescue dogs have done a good job at rescuing Gary and are an important part of his life.

- Avoid walking your dog in the heat. Don't force your animal to exercise after a meal in hot, humid weather. Always exercise in the cool of the early morning or evening. In extremely hot weather, don't leave your dog standing on the street and keep walks to a minimum. He is much closer to the hot asphalt, and your pet's body can heat up quickly. Even in the coolest part of the day, watch for signs of trouble. Glassy eyes and frantic panting indicate a dog who needs help. Get to a veterinarian immediately if you see these symptoms.
- Keep your home cool for your pets. When the temperature outside gets hot, it can be harder to keep the indoors cool. Some people turn their air conditioning off when they leave for the day. If you have a pet at home, this could put him in danger.
- Know which dogs are less tolerant of heat. Some dog breeds are less tolerant of the heat than others. Remember that older, obese or short-nosed dogs (Pugs, Bulldogs, Boston Terriers, Pekingese, Boxers, Shih Tzu's and French Bulldogs) are less tolerant of heat. Also, older dogs, puppies and dogs with health issues can also be more susceptible to hot weather.

Pets rely on us to keep them comfortable and safe year round! Remember, if you're hot, your pets are definitely hot.
