


President's Voice

The **Clean-Up** is when we come together to clean trash and trim weeds and branches in the common greenbelt areas and triangles. It's followed by a neighbor BBQ **Fling** where residents join us who weren't able to participate with the clean-up. A **Wander** is where three homes volunteer to host an hour each to serve drinks and havey hors d'oeuvres (usually the last home has dessert). It's a great way to show off your style, new renovations, or your home still with a vintage look and fixtures. **National Night Out** is a nationwide event designed to help introduce neighbors at a BBQ and to learn ways to make the neighborhood safer.

Crime Watch

As we say goodbye to 2009 and welcome 2010, I continue to be amazed and grateful for the wonderful neighbors that make Wynnewood North such a great place to live. This is a true "old-fashioned" neighborhood of people that watches out for and cares about each other. We have the type of community that many in the 'burbs and other parts of the city can only dream of. Kudos to each and every one of you for doing your part to make Wynnewood North the premier Oak Cliff community.

Looking back on the last year, one of our major accomplishments has been the implementation of Volunteers in Patrol (VIP), our neighborhood watch program conducted in conjunction with the Dallas Police Department. I truly believe that the presence of these patrols has reduced crime in the neighborhood and put would-be criminals on notice that we are actively watching our neighborhood. This program would not be in existence in Wynnewood North without the preparation and efforts of the outgoing Crime Watch Chair, Andy Shell, our late great President Melanie Loe, the Crime Watch Committee, headed by Lynn Sulander (Terry Thomas, Mary Scherer, Pat Ford, Mary K. Trostmann, Doug Norton, Larry and Donna Libby, with a special shout out to Jeff Sappenfield for going above and beyond the call of duty), the assistance of Nancy Skinner and Marilyn Edwards of the Dallas Police Department, and of course all of our dedicated VIP volunteers. As we enter a new decade, I look forward to continuing to work with this group to monitor our neighborhood.

This fall/winter we did experience 10 incidents of criminal activity. In October and December, we had 1 break-in and 4 vandalisms of a motor vehicle. October through December, we had 5 garage or home break-ins. In most of these, the perpetrator took primarily jewelry and computer or camera equipment. From what I can tell, these were all lightweight items that could be carried away in a backpack or bag. This information, combined with the numerous sightings of an unidentified individual or individuals walking throughout the neighborhood, leads to the possibility that the break-ins are being committed by the same person or group of people. PLEASE contact 911 immediately if you notice anyone suspicious around your



house or a neighbor's home. The officers that patrol our neighborhood are aware of the recent rash of break-ins and will respond asap to your call.

Thanks to everyone who has assisted me this year in my duties as Crime Watch Chair. I couldn't have done it without you! Which reminds me, at this month's general neighborhood meeting we will be voting in new WNNA board members. All positions are up for election, so please consider putting your name on the list of nominees!





January Start Planning for Spring

January is a good time to evaluate your gardens and start planning for the Spring. Prepare a sketch of your landscape complete with all permanent fixtures including the house, sidewalks, fences and trees. Keep notes of what did well and what needs to be replaced. Remember, your landscape is a continual work in progress!

Now is the time to prune fruit trees and grapevines. Shade trees and evergreen shrubs can be trimmed to maintain shape and to remove damaged or low lying branches. Do not top Crape Myrtles; only prune to remove damaged branches. Trim summer blooming shrubs and vines to tidy their appearance. Leave a smooth cut flush with the trunk or branch from which you pruned. Apply pruning paint to cuts larger than a pinkie to prevent diseases and insect infestations.
